Course Title, Description, and Credit: Art Appreciation (Art 1113 VTA); (3 Credit Hours): A course designed to provide an understanding and appreciation of the visual arts. "Art Appreciation is the knowledge and understanding of the universal and timeless qualities that identify all great art. The more you appreciate and understand the art of different eras, movements, styles and techniques, the better you can develop, evaluate and improve your own artwork" (Qualities of Great Art).

TEXTBOOK: <u>REQUIRED</u>: Lewis/Lewis. *The Power of Art.* Revised <u>Third Edition</u>. Wadsworth Cengage Learning. (binder format) -- If you do not have a textbook for this course you will be dropped from the course. (<u>No eBook required</u>). No excuses, when it comes to the textbook. See other options to purchase the book under "Textbook Information" in Canvas, you can not "google" your way to success in this course. <u>You must have a textbook for this course</u>.

RELIABLE INTERNET ACCESS IS REQUIRED TO TAKE THIS CLASS – <u>a student's</u> cellphone is not an acceptable internet source/access to take this course.

<u>PREREQUISITIES:</u> Students should have basic college level reading comprehension skills, writing, computer and research skills.

NOTICE: Any dual enrollment student will be required to perform in this class at the same level as an enrolled college student.

<u>DELIVERY FORMAT</u>: This course is solely online, via Canvas course management system. For this course, you will log-on to the course website to gain access to the course syllabus, content, information, assignments, quizzes/exams, communication with me, etc.

Discussion board/ forums will provide interaction/communication between you, your classmates, and me. You will be required to take 1 Proctored exam, in a proctored setting. You will have to make adequate arrangements to take your proctored exam.

Each Weekly Module will contain the information/material required for the assignments/quizzes for that particular week. Detailed instructions will be provided for each assignment – you must follow/read the directions to receive all possible points on each assignment/quiz. Note: you must move through the Modules in sequential order (in order) in order to access each module's weekly assignment, quiz, etc. This is a Self/Fast-Paced Course. You will not be able to access the quizzes/assignments if you proceed directly to the assignment/quiz.

<u>TEACHING METHODOLOGY</u>: This class will incorporate the following: power point presentations, videos, course links, slide analysis, demonstrations, discussion board responses and, art assignments, individual research, etc.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS:

Expect to spend at least twice as many hours per week outside of class as you do in class studying the course content. Additional time will be required for written assignments. The assignments provided will help you use your study hours wisely. Successful completion of this course requires a combination of the following:

- Reading the textbook
- Attending class online
- Completing assignments/quizzes in a timely manner.
- Participating in class activities

There is no short cut for success in this course; it requires reading (and probably rereading) and studying the material using the course objectives as your guide.

As your Instructor, it is my responsibility to:

- Provide the grading scale and detailed grading formula explaining how student grades are to be derived
- Facilitate an effective learning environment through PowerPoints, videos, hands-on art projects, activities, discussions board, and critiques
- Provide a clear description of projects or assignments
- Inform students of policies such as attendance, withdrawal, proctored exams, etc.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

The semester is divided into 4 major learning units divided into 20 chapters during the 8-week duration of the semester. The following "Tentative Course Calendar," located in this syllabus lists the topics to be covered during each of those units of instruction. Note that adjustments may be made to this schedule as required by unforeseen circumstances, and students will be given ample notice of any modifications to the course calendar and/or assignment due dates if such adjustments are needed. During each unit of study/chapter, "class participation" is required. Each student should be prepared to respond to the online discussion/activity online, asking questions or offering their thoughts about the topic(s) covered in that instructional unit. Additional questions and discussion comments are welcome, and students are encouraged to communicate with the instructor throughout the semester. During each week there are reading assignments from the textbook. When there is a reading assignment, there is also an Assignment, Quiz, etc. The quizzes are taken online and will indicate that the student is familiar with the content covered in that reading.

Submission/Due Date: All assignments are due on Sundays Only, unless otherwise notified by the instructor. There is only one Late Day Submission for this class, and that is on Monday by 11:59 PM (-15 points). Assignments/Quizzes are Not Re-Opened, so please complete your assignments ahead of time.

Microsoft Office is required to take this course (Google Docs will not be submitted as a substitute for Microsoft Office documents that are required for this course). All assignments MUST be submitted in Microsoft Word Format, it's your responsibility to ensure your assignments are submitted in the proper format.

Note: If you would like to purchase Microsoft Office by the year, or make monthly payments of \$ 7. 49 (This is an option). CCC might offer free Microsoft Office to enrolled students, please check with your advisor/and or the Business Office.

Most libraries and schools' computer labs will have Microsoft Word/Power Point (This is an option). However, you must make time/plan to complete your assignments/quizzes on time.

Plan, ahead of time, if you plan to complete your assignments in your college or local town library (Remember, you have a week to complete assignments—unless, otherwise noted by the instructor.) Please do not use that you do not have internet, or Microsoft Office as valid excuses for assignments/quizzes not submit, you must have access to the internet, a textbook, and Microsoft Office to be successful and enrolled in this course.

MATERIALS:

- Materials needed: access to a textbook, a computer/laptop, note book paper, reliable internet access, sharpie, drawing paper/computer paper, pencil and/or pen notebook/binder/and or folder, memory storage devices, and Microsoft Office: Word/Power Point. Note: Other materials may be added in order to meet the needs of the assignment (s)/objective.
- Note: You can not use your cell phone as your total means of computer access to be enrolled in this course. If you do not have a computer it's your responsibility to go to your local library, school computer lab, etc. to complete all required assignments for this course, plan ahead of time, not the last minute.
- Do not screenshot your answers, and then submit your assignment.
- Project materials will be discussed when projects are introduced; students are responsible for acquiring project materials (i.e. scissors, glue, colored pencils, etc.)

<u>SPECIAL COURSE EXIT REQUIREMENTS</u>: The student displays knowledge of the elements of art and principles of design, materials and tools artists use, and major artists and art forms in all periods from Prehistoric to Contemporary Art. Submit/Complete all required work, art activities, read all required material, projects, passed required exams, etc.

OVERALL COURSE GOALS: The student will be able to identify artists and works of art from all periods and understand the motivation and techniques used by the artists. Students will learn to formally analyze a work of art using their knowledge of art elements and design principles.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. The student will learn the elements of art and principles of design and will be able to identify these terms in various artworks.
- 2. The student will be familiar with a variety of tools, techniques, and materials artists use and will be able to identify these terms in various artworks.
- 3. The student will be familiar with the history of art, including being able to recognize selected artists and their corresponding works of art from Prehistoric times to Modern times.
- 4. The student will learn to talk/discuss and write about art and artists.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. Learn how to explain, interpret and elaborate on the subject, form and content of visual art

demonstrate an understanding of art vocabulary in the critical analysis of art.

- 2. Learn to identify, distinguish and describe various art media and techniques
- 3. Learn to recognize and identify art and artists from different periods.
- 4. Create works of art that demonstrate an understanding of the art making process.

VIRTUAL/ CLASSROOM CONDUCT:

At times we will be viewing and discussing images depicting potentially offensive subjects or addressing controversial themes. Students are expected to maintain an objective, critical perspective and approach these works from a point of intellectual understanding and not simply an emotional and/or moral reaction.

Disrespect towards the instructor or any other student will not be tolerated and is grounds for dismissal from the class.

CANVAS INFORMATION & NOTICES:

- <u>First</u>, review your homepage on Canvas; then you will proceed through the modules instructions will be provided. Begin with the "Course Orientation Module."
- <u>Do not skip the information in each module, and move directly to the quizzes, without reading the directions/information, first. All quizzes are timed and you have one attempt, only.</u>
- Read the Brief Overview of the Course, it will be posted in Canvas (Module 00).
- I will respond to emails within 24 hours, or sooner (If possible), except for weekends. I normally try to respond as soon as I can. Do not wait until the day/night that assignments are due to email me. Plan in Advance. I am not at my computer during the night hours.
- During the weekend, response time is within 35-48 hours.
- This course syllabus/online class is not structured, or planned around any student current job/employment you must make arrangements with your job/employer for any proctored exams.
- You must move through the Modules in sequential order, to access each module's weekly assignment, quiz, etc.
- Check Canvas, your announcements, and emails in Canvas, Daily.
- Note: I am not constantly at my computer; this is a self-paced course. So, do not wait until the due to submit assignments, work in advance to avoid any issues, if you email me on Saturdays, I will respond with 38 over the weekends. So, ask questions during the week.
- Holidays are not acknowledged in MSVCC online course: this is a Continuously/Non-stop Course.
