STATEMENT CONCERNING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

You must have access to a computer/internet service to take this course. Your cell phone/iPad is not considerate a legitimate internet access, and can not be used to take the exams.

- **II. COURSE DESCRIPTION:** Art Appreciation is designed to provide an understanding and appreciation of the visual arts. "Art Appreciation is the knowledge and understanding of the universal and timeless qualities that identify all great art. The more you appreciate and understand the art of different eras, movements, styles and techniques, the better you can develop, evaluate and improve your own artwork" (Qualities of Great Art).
 - **<u>PREREQUISITIES</u>**: Students should have basic college level reading, writing, computer and research skills.
- **III. TEACHING METHODOLOGY:** This class will incorporate the following: Power Point presentations, videos, course links, slide/image analysis, demonstrations, discussion board responses, etc.

EXTRA CREDIT:

Students are encouraged to participate in Extra Credit activities (if assigned) to help in maintaining their classroom grade point average and to increase their knowledge of the Visual arts. However, there will be posted time and/or date restrictions for turning in extra credit work. (watch for these in "announcements" and assignments)

DELIVERY FORMAT: This course is solely online, via Canvas course management system. For this course, you will log-on to the course website to gain access to course syllabus, content, information, assignments, quizzes/exams, communication with me, etc. Discussion board/ forums will provide interaction/communication between you, your classmates, and me. You will be required to take **<u>1</u> Proctored exam online**, the exam will be a proctored setting.

<u>COURSE STRUCTURE</u>: The course serves to introduce undergraduates from various disciplines to visual art forms from diverse cultures and time periods. Students will develop an aesthetic awareness by studying the major achievements and developments of mankind as recorded in visual art. The textbook is divided into four units: <u>Fundamentals</u>, <u>Media &</u> <u>Processes</u>, <u>History and Context</u> and <u>Themes</u>. Your quizzes and assignments were designed using all four units.

<u>You will use Canvas to access this course</u>: Check CANVAS Daily for readings, test updates, discussions, assignments, announcements, quizzes, etc. The Modules will help you Navigate through the Course. Assignments are due on Sunday Nights at Midnight (11:59 P.M.) There will be one late day submission, Only (-15 Mondays). <u>Email me if you have</u> trouble accessing a link ahead of time. Reading your Chapters Assignments as required.

- <u>First</u>, review your homepage on Canvas; then you will proceed through the modules instructions will be provided.
- I will respond to emails within 24-38 hours, or sooner (If possible); except for weekends.
- You can send emails through the week, up until Friday at 1:00 pm, any email after 1 pm your email will be addressed on Monday.

- Note: I am not constantly at my computer: this is a self-paced course.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance Policy – When a student enrolls in a course, the student assumes the responsibility for completing all assignments and otherwise satisfying the requirements of that course. Realizing that from time to time there may be just cause for absence, the College has established the policy outlined below.

MSVCC defines attendance in online courses as documentable active participation in course learning activities. Activities will be measured weekly and will be based upon documentable engagement with the course content.

In order to be counted present each week, the student must complete the work that has been provided. This counts as participation. Just logging in each week does not count as attendance. The student must participate in a weekly, engaging, documentable activity.

For full term courses, a student cannot exceed more than $\underline{2}$ absences.

For intensive term courses (like this one), a student cannot exceed more than $\underline{1}$ absence.

For 4-week courses, a student cannot exceed more than $\underline{1}$ absence

ABSENCES:

Official Absences - An official absence is one in which the student is participating in an official function sponsored by the college (ECCC).

Excused Absences - <u>THERE ARE NO EXCUSED ABSENCES</u> --special exceptions MAY be considered (i.e., doctor's excuse, death in the family, etc.) This will be determined by the instructor. **Your employment/personal life are Not excused absents**. <u>If an exam or any assignment **conflicts** with your work – you must make arrangements with your job – not the instructor.</u>

Important Note: All instructors may have different policies/format to adhere by in their own individual online course (s).

LATEWORK:

Students not turning in/completing work on time will be penalized -15 points for One LATE DAY (ONLY). This does not mean class periods. For example, if an assignment is due on a Sunday, but turned in on Monday, it can receive no grade higher than an 85%/ B (-15 one late submission). There is just one late submission day (Mondays), then the Assignment Box will close, and you will receive a "Zero" for any other assignments. You have an entire week to complete assignments.

Assignments not submitted by the late submission date (Mondays), or assignments not submitted through the appropriate Canvas link/format, are not accepted and are awarded zero points. There are no exceptions to this policy. This syllabus serves as notification to all students regarding late assignments.

Note: You do not have to email me, (the instructor), when you submit an assignment late (just refer to the the above statements – You have a week to complete your assignments -- Plenty of time.

Note: Completing assignments before the due date is highly recommended. Do not wait until the day/night an assignment is due -- computer issues may occur, and you may not complete your assignment on time (This will result in points being deducted), regardless. The school and the instructor are not responsible for your computer issues. You must call/email technical support for computer issues. The instructor is not responsible for your computer issues the night before an assignment due. However, if a computer issue occurs with the majority of students – then, I will investigate the issue.

1st offense within a course: The student will receive a grade of zero for the assignment or project.

2nd offense within the same course: The student will be withdrawn from the course and given a grade of "XF". Students are not allowed to withdraw from a course to avoid a grade of "XF".

3rd offense: If a student commits three acts of academic dishonesty during his or her student career at East Central Community College, either within the same course or across more than one course, the student's case will be reviewed by the respective Dean or Director.
