II. Course Description:

Art Appreciation is designed to provide an understanding and appreciation of the visual arts. "Art Appreciation is the knowledge and understanding of the universal and timeless qualities that identify all great art. The more you appreciate and understand the art of different eras, movements, styles and techniques, the better you can develop, evaluate and improve your own artwork" (Qualities of Great Art)

III. Teaching Methodology:

This class will incorporate the following: Power Point presentations, videos, course links, slide/image analysis, demonstrations, discussion board responses, etc.
