- B. Pre-/co-requisite courses - None
- C. Course description – A computer Competency course which introduces concepts, terminology, operating systems, electronic communications, and applications. Concepts are demonstrated and supplemented by hands-on computer use.
- D. Goals and Objectives: At the end of the course, students will gain an understanding with the general concepts, terminology and theory of modern computers. The students will be able to use the knowledge and information both for their academic preparation as well as their professional careers. The students will be given the opportunity to learn:
  - Both the generalized knowledge to understand information technology as well as the skills to use it.
  - To understand the functions of computer information systems and the equipment required for data input, processing, output, and storage.
  - The essential elements of microcomputer hardware, software, operating systems, storage, computer connectivity, and communication technology.
  - Identify and discuss legal, ethical and privacy issues in the use of computers and information in their own lives.
  - Hands-on, working knowledge of Microsoft Word, Excel, Access and Power Point using Microsoft Office 2013.

#### **IV. Instructional Techniques**

Instructional methods for the class are through Canvas, text book, weekly assignments and tests, discussion board, PowerPoint presentations, MyITLab, Publisher's Website, and Office 2013 Applications, Internet research.

#### **V. Attendance Policy**

Hinds Community College's current attendance/tardy/withdrawal policy will be strictly followed in this course. Attendance will be measured by:

- Submitting Assignments by the schedule date/time
- Taking tests on schedule time
- Participation in class discussion and discussion board.
- Contact with instructor when required.

You will usually have a total of six to seven assignments to be completed each week. Failure to do at least four assignments each week will result in an absence for the week. One or more absences will be an F for the course once the notice of absence has been sent to the student.

#### **Excessive Unexcused Absences:**

A Notice of Absence (NOA) e-mail will be sent when a student has accumulated excessive unexcused absences. Since it is 8- week course, if you miss a week of assigned work, excessive notice of absent will be sent. All Excessive Absence Notices will be sent to student's official Hinds e-mail via on-line attendance system.

The Notice of Absence requires the student to contact the instructor immediately to discuss the following options:

1. Return to the class.
2. Withdraw from the class with a 'W' during the withdrawal period if all fees are paid.
3. Withdraw from all classes on dates listed in the College Calendar if all fees are paid (See counselor in Counseling Office).
4. Be dropped from class with a grade of 'F.'

If the student fails to contact the instructor within seven (7) "calendar days\*" of the send date of the Notice of Absence, he/she may be dropped from class with a grade of 'F.'

\* "Calendar days" do not include school holidays but do include normal two-day weekends.

## Student Participation

The primary reason that online students have problems is because they get behind on their assignments. EVERY exam/assignments/projects has a required due date. Each Monday morning, 12:00 AM your tests/assignments/projects for the week will be visible to you. The work is due by 11:59 PM on Sunday unless otherwise specified otherwise by your instructor. As one assignment's due date occurs, you need to begin to work on the next one. Until your instructor has graded all assignments, your grades will not be visible to you. If you complete an assignment early, it is okay to go ahead and submit it.

This course is NOT a self-paced course. Students are expected to keep up with due dates and maintain the schedule. Your participation and submission of the assignments will be used for grading and also to keep track of your attendance. You are given six to seven assignments per week. Failure to complete at least four assignments per week will result in absence for that week. Your attendance is submitted every week online to the Distance Learning Office. Make sure you are active. If you are not active, Notice of Absence will be sent to you through go. Hinds e-mail and in the following week you will be dropped with an 'F' if there is no communication from you. Any student that misses a total of six assignments will be dropped from the class with an F.

Any student that fails to complete the initial projects in the semester by January 25<sup>th</sup> will be dropped from this course as a No-Show.

All assignments must be received by the assigned due dates. There are no exceptions to this rule. Any late work will receive a zero (0). Part of learning how to use the computer is to learn how to avoid machine failure, head crashes, network congestion, and ISP server unavailability while still meeting deadlines.

Course Calendars are posted on the Canvas site. Assignments will not be available after the due dates and cannot be submitted any more. Make up work will not be given in the course. Student grades will be based on the individual work on the common work given for the entire class.
